HUSKERS WRAP UP ROAD TRIP WITH WEEKEND SERIES AT IOWA

The 19th-ranked Nebraska softball team wraps up a seven-game road trip with a three-game Big Ten Conference series with the Iowa Hawkeyes in Iowa City, Iowa, this weekend. First pitch on Friday is set for 6:30 p.m., with Saturday's game beginning at 5 p.m. and Sunday's finale starting at 1 p.m.

Fans can follow this weekend's series by listening to Nate Rohr call all of the action for a free, live radio broadcast of all three games on Huskers.com. The Huskers are 3-1 thus far on their road trip, winning two-of-three games at Illinois last weekend and defeating Creighton in Omaha on Wednesday.

Overall, the Huskers are 9-3 on the road this season, including 2-1 in Big Ten play. Nebraska has won eight of its last nine road games, one year after finishing 7-12 on the road in 2012, including 4-8 in conference road games. Nebraska is on the verge of winning 10 road games in a season for the first time since 2011 and for just the second time in the last nine years. Only three teams in school history have won more than 10 road games in a season, the 1984 Huskers (14), the 2001 squad (12) and the 2011 Huskers (11). This year's group has nine road games remaining on its schedule, including this weekend.

While winning eight of their last nine road games, the Huskers have been able to pull out some close, late-inning victories despite the opponent having the final at bat. The streak of eight road wins in nine tries began with an upset of top-ranked Oklahoma, 1-0, on March 2, when the Huskers snapped the 30-2 Sooners' season-opening 17-game win streak. One week later, Nebraska scored twice in its final at bat in the top of the seventh inning to break a 1-1 tie and win at Wichita State, 3-1. Last week at Illinois, the Huskers scored five times in their final at bat in the top of the seventh inning to erase a one-run deficit and defeat the Fighting Illini, 6-2. Then on Wednesday at Creighton, Nebraska quickly fell into a 2-0 hole before scoring four straight runs. The Huskers then held onto the win when junior right-hander Tatum Edwards struck out back-to-back hitters with the bases loaded and Nebraska clinging to a 4-3 lead in the bottom of the seventh inning.

Edwards' clutch performance helped her win her ninth straight start. A native of Murrieta, Calif., Edwards will put that streak on the line this weekend against an Iowa squad that won two of last year's three games in Iowa City. Edwards, who ranks third in the Big Ten with a career-high 17 victories this spring, will try to help Nebraska's pitching staff limit a Hawkeye offense that is coming off an 18-run performance on Wednesday against Drake. Iowa and Nebraska are two of the highest-ranked Big Ten teams, as the Huskers are No. 18 in the NCAA RPI rankings, while Iowa is No. 24.

HUSKERS TO WATCH



Tatum Edwards, Jr., RHP

Tatum Edwards is 9-0 with a 0.97 ERA in her last nine starts, covering 58.0 innings. She has added 70 strikeouts and held opposing hitters to a .146 average in that time. Offensively,

Edwards has produced eight RBIs and three home runs in the nine games, while allowing a total of only 12 RBIs and one homer to all opposing hitters combined.



Taylor Edwards, Jr., C

In four games last week, Taylor Edwards posted a .765 on-base percentage while reaching base safely in 13 of her 17 plate appearances. She went 5-for-9 at the plate with two doubles,

two home runs and nine RBIs last week. Edwards has reached base safely in a season-high 14 consecutive games after going 1-for-4 at Creighton on Wednesday.

SCOUTING THE IOWA HAWKEYES (21-13 OVERALL, 1-5 BIG TEN)

Iowa is hosting its third straight home Big Ten Conference series. The Hawkeyes, who are 21-13 overall, are off to a disappointing start in conference play at just 1-5. Iowa was swept by Minnesota at home two weeks ago, before losing two of three to Wisconsin last weekend. Iowa is the fourth-highest Big Ten team in the NCAA RPI rankings, coming in at No. 24. The Huskers and Hawkeyes share four common opponents in Drake, Maryland, Oklahoma State and UNO. Nebraska posted a 6-0 record against that group, while Iowa went 4-1. The Hawkeyes are 5-6 against ranked teams this spring.

Offensively, Iowa is batting .271 as a team while averaging 4.6 runs per game. The Hawkeyes are led by one of the Big Ten's best hitters, sophomore Megan Blank. One of three Iowa starters hitting above .330, Blank leads the Big Ten with 40 RBIs, ranks third with 10 doubles and eighth with a .413 average. Johnnie Dowling ranks second on the team with a .362 average, and she leads the Hawkeyes with 29 runs scored and 12 stolen bases. Kayla Massey is batting .337 and has hit six of Iowa's 17 home runs, while adding 24 RBIs.

In the circle, Iowa owns a 2.61 staff ERA while allowing 3.5 runs per game. Massey leads the way with an 11-7 record and a 1.99 ERA in 123.1 innings. Massey has thrown more than half of Iowa's total innings, while tossing three shutouts and adding one save. Opponents are hitting just .231 against her, while she has struck out 67 and walked 54. Chelsea Lyon has also seen extensive action, compiling an 8-6 record with a 3.60 ERA in 85.2 innings. She owns as many walks as strikeouts (50) and opponents are hitting .251 against her. Micaela Whitney (2-0, 2.62 ERA in 16.0 IP) rounds out a Hawkeye staff that has allowed only seven home runs and just 39 extra-base hits in 34 games this season.

HUSKER HISTORY VS. IOWA

Iowa leads the all-time series with Nebraska, 10-9, after winning two of the three meetings in Iowa City last season. The Huskers are playing at Iowa for the second straight season, and they own a 4-4 all-time record in Iowa City, including a 2-4 mark in regular-season games and a 1-2 record in Big Ten Conference games. The three-game series last season marked the first time NU and Iowa had met since the 2006 NCAA Tournament in Iowa City, while each of the previous five meetings had come in NCAA Regional play. Last year's series was the first time the programs had met in the regular season since 1999. Husker Head Coach Rhonda Revelle is 6-7 in her career against Iowa, including a 1-2 mark against third-year Hawkeye Head Coach Marla Looper.

Nebraska had a chance to clinch the series on day one last year, nearly sweeping a doubleheader. The Huskers rallied from a one-run deficit by scoring six times in the fourth and fifth innings in game one, defeating the Hawkeyes, 7-4. Tatum Edwards started in the circle and allowed one run on two hits in 3.0 innings, but she did not factor into the decision. Edwards was 2-for-3 at the plate with an RBI, as Nebraska got production throughout its lineup with six different players driving in a run. In game two, the Huskers again came from behind to take a 6-5 lead into the bottom of the seventh inning, only to see Iowa score twice and rally for the win. Brooke Thomason produced three RBIs in the loss, while Courtney Breault homered. In game three, two Husker errors led to five unearned runs as Iowa captured the series with a 6-4 win. Tatum Edwards allowed only one earned run in 4.0 innings, while Taylor Edwards drove in two runs and walked twice.

Gabby Banda led Nebraska with a .400 average (4-for-10) against Iowa last year. Breault batted .375 (3-for-8) with a home run and two RBIs, while Taylor Edwards was 2-for-7, but doubled, walked five times and produced three RBIs. Thomason had only two hits in the series, but produced a team-high four RBIs. Tatum Edwards allowed five runs (two earned) in 7.0 innings, allowing only five hits, while walking eight.

For Iowa, Megan Blank was 5-for-11 (.455) in the series with two doubles and three RBIs, while Johnnie Dowling was 4-for-9 (.444). In the circle, Kayla Massey was 1-0 with a 3.62 ERA in 9.2 innings against NU, while Chelsea Lyon was 1-1 with a 5.56 ERA in 11.1 innings.

QUICK HITTERS

The information below provides a quick glimpse of a few statistics and brief notes heading into this weekend:

- ▶ Nebraska owns an all-time record of 479-233 (.673) in the month of April.
- ▶ NU was ranked 18th in the second NCAA RPI ranking released on Monday. The Huskers remained the highest ranked Big Ten team, while overall the conference had four teams ranked in the top 25 and six teams in the top 50.
- ▶ NU's roster features seven freshmen, tying for the most freshmen in Coach Revelle's 21 seasons (also 2008).
- ▶ Five freshmen started the season opener, the most in Coach Revelle's tenure and believed to be the most ever.
- ▶ NU's starting lineup has featured at least three freshmen in every game, including 14 games with five freshmen.
- ▶ The freshmen have combined for 23 extra-base hits, the 10th-highest total by a freshman class in school history.
- ▶ Nebraska has allowed one run or less in 19 of its 33 games this season, including 11 shutouts. In 55 games last season, NU allowed one run or less just 16 times, posting 13 shutouts.
- ▶ Nebraska's first four hitters in the batting order (Kiki Stokes, Gabby Banda, Taylor Edwards and Brooke Thomason) have remained the same for all 33 games this season.
- ▶ Five Huskers have started all 33 games at the same position this spring (Taylor Edwards - C, Hailey Decker - 2B, Gabby Banda, - 3B, Kiki Stokes - CF, Brooke Thomason - RF).
- ▶ Husker pitching has not allowed an extra-base hit in 14 of its 33 games this season.
- ▶ Nebraska is 22-1 when out-hitting its opponent this season.
- ▶ The Huskers are 24-1 when recording at least five hits.
- ▶ NU is 19-0 when it scores first and 12-0 when it scores in the first inning.
- ▶ Nebraska is 15-0 when it scores five-or-more runs.
- ▶ NU is 20-0 when leading after four innings.
- ▶ NU is 9-3 in true road games this season, after posting a 7-12 road record in 2012.
- ▶ The Huskers are 3-0 in extra-innings this season and have won six straight extra-inning games.
- ▶ Only four Big Ten pitchers have shut out a ranked team this season, Nebraska's Tatum Edwards and Emily Lockman, along with Wisconsin's Cassandra Darrah and Ohio State's Alex DiDomenico.
- ▶ In the circle, 30 of the 80 hits Tatum Edwards has allowed this season have been infield singles (38 percent).
- ▶ Offensively, 14 of Tatum Edwards' 19 hits have gone for extra bases, including seven doubles and seven homers.
- ▶ Tatum Edwards enters this weekend with 95 career RBIs, five shy of 100.
- ▶ Taylor Edwards enters this weekend with 96 career runs scored. She needs four runs scored to become only the third player in school history to produce 100 career hits, runs and RBIs prior to her senior season.
- ▶ Gabby Banda is one double shy of cracking Nebraska's all-time top 10.
- ▶ Banda has started 168 consecutive games for the Huskers.
- ▶ Brooke Thomason and Taylor Edwards have each hit 31 career home runs, giving Nebraska a lineup that features two players with 30 career home runs for only the second time in school history (also 1998). NU has never had a lineup with three players with 30 career homers and Tatum Edwards owns 28 career home runs.
- ▶ The Edwards twins have homered in the same game nine times in their careers, including twice in 2013.

WALK THIS WAY

Nebraska's offense had its patience tested in a three-game series at Illinois last weekend. The Huskers drew 29 walks in the three games, averaging one walk every 3.9 plate appearances. Nebraska was also hit by five pitches last weekend, posting a .442 on-base percentage despite hitting only .203 in the series. The Huskers drew 10 walks in game one, six walks in game two and 13 walks in game three. Nebraska posted two games with at least 10 walks last weekend, after recording 10 walks in a game only twice since 2001 entering the Illinois series. The Huskers' 13 walks in game three tied for its most since 2003 against Pacific, while Nebraska's five hit-by-pitches in game one tied for its most since 2008 against Northern Colorado.

THOMASON PRODUCES FOURTH STRAIGHT 30-RBI SEASON

Senior Brooke Thomason produced a two-run double in the top of the first inning of Nebraska's 7-1 victory at Illinois last Sunday, giving her 30 RBIs for the season. Thomason, who ranks third in school history with 151 career RBIs after driving in two more on Wednesday at Creighton, is the only player in school history to produce four 30-RBI seasons. She drove in 38 runs as a freshman, 34 as a sophomore and 47 as a junior, a class record.

A native of Overland Park, Kan., Thomason had been the only Husker to open her career with three straight 30-RBI seasons before junior Taylor Edwards matched that feat last weekend at Illinois. Thomason was also the only Husker to homer at least seven times in each of her first three seasons, before junior Tatum Edwards matched that feat with her seventh home run this season against North Dakota State. One of only four Huskers with 30 career doubles and 30 career home runs and one of just nine players in school history with 100 career runs, hits and RBIs, Thomason needs two more home runs this season to become the first Husker to produce four seven-homer seasons in a career.

TAYLOR EDWARDS SETS WALK RECORD

Junior Taylor Edwards walked six times last week, increasing her career total to 97 walks. Edwards passed three-time All-American Jennifer Lizama for the most walks through a player's first three seasons in school history. Lizama walked 92 times through her junior season. Edwards, who tied the school record with 40 walks in 2012, is only 28 walks from passing Lizama's overall school-record total of 124 career walks. Edwards was also hit by three pitches last weekend, moving into a tie for sixth place on NU's all-time chart (18).

A LOOK AT THE PROBABLE LINEUP

- 1 KIKI STOKES, CF (33 STARTS, .298, 0 2B, 2 HR, 9 RBIs)**
One of the fastest players in school history, Stokes was a three-time NFCA High School All-American and two-time, first-team honoree who set Olathe East High School records with a .605 career batting average, 181 hits, 163 runs scored and 87 stolen bases. She hit an inside-the-park home run at Wichita State.
- 2 GABBY BANDA, 3B (33 STARTS, .259, 4 2B, 0 HR, 13 RBIs)**
Banda is in her third season as NU's starting third baseman and fourth season as a starter on the left side of the infield. A third-team All-Big Ten selection in 2012, Banda led NU with a career-high .352 average and 14 doubles in 2012. She has started 198 games in her Husker career, including 168 straight.
- 3 TAYLOR EDWARDS, C (33 STARTS, .330, 6 2B, 8 HR, 34 RBIs)**
The only All-America catcher in school history, Edwards set NU freshman records with 18 homers and 67 RBIs in 2011 while earning third-team All-America honors. In 2012, she walked a school-record 40 times. She set the school record with 8 RBIs against Illinois-Chicago on Feb. 9, when she hit two grand slams.
- 4 BROOKE THOMASON, RF (33 STARTS, .365, 8 2B, 5 HR, 32 RBIs)**
An All-Big 12 selection in 2010 and All-Big Ten pick in 2012, Thomason ranks third in NU history with 151 RBIs and fourth in homers (31) and extra-base hits (70). Thomason is the first player in school history to produce four 30-RBI seasons and is just the fourth Husker with 30 career doubles and 30 home runs.
- 5 DAWNA TYSON, DP (24 STARTS, .313, 0 2B, 3 HR, 13 RBIs)**
Tyson has split time at first base and at designated player earning 24 total starts, including 15 as the DP and nine at first. Tyson has started 18 of the last 20 games, producing 16 hits, three homers, seven runs and 10 RBIs in that stretch. The second Tyson to play at NU, Dawna was a two-time All-CIF selection.
- 6 MATTIE FOWLER, 1B (25 STARTS, .293, 2 2B, 3 HR, 14 RBIs)**
Fowler started every game as a freshman in 2012, including 49 starts at shortstop. She tore her ACL last summer and has moved to first base. She was limited early, but has started 24 games at first, including 16 straight. She has produced the game-winning RBI in five of NU's 18 Big Ten wins dating back to 2012.
- 7 HAILEY DECKER, 2B (33 STARTS, .230, 5 2B, 4 HR, 17 RBIs)**
Decker has started all 33 games at second and became the third player in school history to homer in her first career at bat. Twice named the Oregon Offensive Player of the Year, Decker posted a .599 career prep average. Her father Steve is the coordinator of minor league hitting instruction for the San Francisco Giants.
- 8 ALICIA ARMSTRONG, SS (32 STARTS, .333, 6 2B, 2 HR, 7 RBIs)**
Armstrong has started 32 games at shortstop this spring, missing one game with an ankle injury. Armstrong, a three-sport all-state selection as a high school senior, is focusing on softball for the first time after setting Nebraska state records with a .690 average as a senior and a .514 career mark.
- 9 JORDAN BETTIOL, LF (30 STARTS, .225, 2 2B, 0 HR, 4 RBIs)**
Bettiol has started 30 games in left field, after making 18 outfield starts and 20 total starts as a freshman in 2012. A first-team high school All-American as a senior, Bettiol reached base at a .389 clip in 2012 and scored 17 runs, while batting .267. She has doubled twice this season in limited time in the batting order.
- 10 TATUM EDWARDS, P (23 STARTS, .275, 7 2B, 7 HR, 15 RBIs; 19 STARTS, 17-5, 1.77 ERA, 121 Ks, 122.2 IP)**
Edwards plays a key dual role for NU this spring. In the circle, the two-time 2012 Big Ten Pitcher of the Week has allowed one earned run or less in 40 of 58 career appearances. At the plate, she is a two-time all-conference honoree who ranks sixth in NU history with a .572 career slugging percentage.
- OR EMILY LOCKMAN, P (15 STARTS, 9-2, 1.38 ERA, 59 Ks, 86.1 IP)**
The 2012 California Gatorade Player of the Year and first-team high school All-American, Lockman went 74-19 in her prep career with a 0.89 ERA. She has thrown three shutouts this season, including the first no-hitter by a Husker freshman since 2003 and a shutout of No. 1 Oklahoma on March 2.
- P DANICA BISHOP (0 STARTS, 0-0, 1.75 ERA, 5 Ks, 8.0 IP)**
A hard worker making great strides in her pitching development, Bishop serves as Nebraska's No. 3 pitcher this spring. She was an all-county all-star as a senior for Woodbridge High School.
- IF COURTNEY BREault (3 STARTS, .143, 0 2B, 1 HR, 2 RBIs)**
Breault battled through injuries to emerge as the second-team All-Big Ten second baseman in her first year at NU in 2012. This year, Breault has earned three starts as the designated player.
- IF KYLEE MUIR (9 STARTS, .273, 3 2B, 1 HR, 5 RBIs)**
After backing up all-conference players at both designated player and first base the past two seasons, Muir has seen more playing time this year, exceeding her career totals in hits, runs and RBIs.
- C SAMMI NOLAND (0 STARTS, .000, 0 2B, 0 HR, 0 RBIs)**
Noland backs up All-American Taylor Edwards behind the plate, while also earning time as both a pinch-hitter and pinch runner. She was a two-time All-Southern Arizona selection in high school.
- OF MEGAN SOUTHWORTH (2 STARTS, .000, 0 2B, 0 HR, 0 RBIs)**
Southworth is competing for playing time in left field, a position where she started a team-high 28 games in 2011. Southworth also owns more pinch hits (8) than the rest of the NU roster combined (4).

TATUM EDWARDS HAS WON LAST NINE STARTS

Junior right-hander Tatum Edwards has been excellent in a starting role since allowing a career-high nine earned runs in a loss at No. 1 Oklahoma on March 2. Edwards has made nine starts since the Oklahoma game, posting a 9-0 record with a 0.97 ERA and 70 strikeouts in 58.0 innings. Opponents are hitting just .146 against her, and Edwards has thrown four shutouts and has not allowed an earned run in six of her nine starts, including a streak of 33.2 consecutive innings without allowing an earned run. In her last nine starts, Edwards has tossed a one-hitter, a pair of two-hitters, a three-hitter, four four-hitters and a five-hitter.

Edwards has also helped herself offensively during the win streak. She has been in the starting batting order in each of her last nine starts in the circle, producing eight runs, three doubles, three homers and eight RBIs in only 26 at bats. During that same stretch, Edwards has held all opposing hitters to just 12 runs, three doubles, one home run and 12 RBIs in 199 combined at bats.

HUSKERS BOAST TWO OF BIG TEN'S BEST PITCHERS

Led by the combination of junior right-hander Tatum Edwards and freshman right-hander Emily Lockman, Nebraska boasts one of the best pitching staffs in the Big Ten Conference and two of the league's top pitchers. The Huskers lead the Big Ten in shutouts and opponent batting average, while ranking second in ERA and third in wins. NU has allowed one run or less in 19 of its 33 games in 2013.

Edwards is 17-5 with a 1.77 ERA in 122.2 innings. She has already established career highs this season in wins, innings, shutouts (6), complete games (15) strikeouts (121) and saves (1). Edwards boasts the sixth-best ERA in the Big Ten, while ranking second in shutouts and opponent batting average, third in wins and fifth in strikeouts. She has also allowed the fewest home runs of any Big Ten pitcher who has pitched a minimum of 2.0 innings per game. Edwards has not allowed a run in 10 of her 23 appearances in 2013 while not allowing an earned run in 13 games.

Edwards is 16-1 with a 1.12 ERA against non-ranked teams, and she has also made quality starts against ranked opponents, tossing a four-hit shutout against No. 23 Florida State, allowing no earned runs in a 1-0 loss at No. 16 Arizona and allowing only two hits and two runs in her first of two starts against No. 1 Oklahoma.

Lockman has also impressed this season. The two-time Big Ten Freshman of the Week, Lockman is 9-2 with a 1.38 ERA in 86.1 innings. She ranks second in the Big Ten in ERA, eighth in opponent batting average (.229) and ninth in wins. Lockman has allowed one earned run or less in 11 of her 15 starts this season, while allowing more than two earned runs only once. She tossed the first no-hitter by a Husker freshman since 2003 in her fourth career start. Lockman has also excelled in her two starts against ranked opponents. Lockman tossed a four-hitter but was on the losing end of a 1-0 decision to eighth-ranked Cal on Feb. 24. Her next start came at No. 1 Oklahoma, when she snapped the Sooners' 17-game season-opening win streak with a seven-hit shutout. She is one of only two pitchers to defeat OU this season, and the only pitcher to shut out the powerful Sooner lineup.

A key to the duo's success has been keeping the ball down. Of the 163 hits NU has allowed, only 32 have gone for extra-bases, including just eight homers. Opponents are only averaging an extra-base hit every 24.7 at bats, including 14 games where NU has not allowed a single extra-base hit.

Led by Edwards and Lockman, Nebraska's staff has shown great improvement from last year. NU has owned a season ERA below 2.00 following 31 of its 33 games this season, including twice where the Huskers' season ERA was below 1.00. Last year, the lowest Nebraska's season ERA stood after any one game was 2.79. NU also owns six more wins through 33 games than it did a year ago, while boasting a 1.61 lower ERA. NU has four more shutouts this year than it did at the same point last year, while allowing 16 fewer extra-base hits.

FOWLER A CLUTCH CO-CAPTAIN

Sophomore Mattie Fowler has been a clutch hitter through her first season-and-a-half as a Husker. Fowler, a co-captain, has especially come through in the clutch in late innings and against Big Ten teams. She owns eight game-winning RBIs in her career, including three in the seventh inning or later and five against Big Ten teams.

Nebraska has played six extra-inning games in Fowler's career, winning all six games. In 2012, NU won three games in the eighth inning. Fowler drove in the game-winning run in two of those victories and scored the game-winning run in the third. This season, Fowler has scored the game-winning run in one of the Huskers' three extra-inning victories, while also producing a game-winning, walk-off, two-run single in the bottom of the seventh inning against UNO. She also added a clutch game-tying, two-run homer in the sixth inning against Northwestern on March 22.

WINNING TIME

Nebraska has won six games in its final at bat this season, including four times in an eight-game stretch from March 9 to March 22. The Huskers' first win in the final at bat came in the fourth game of the season on Feb. 10. Nebraska trailed Illinois-Chicago 3-2 in the bottom of the eighth inning, before scoring twice in its final at bat, highlighted by sophomore Jordan Bettiol's walk-off, RBI double.

The Huskers would not need another late-inning victory until nearly a month later. At Wichita State on March 9, the game was tied 1-1 with two outs in the top of the seventh inning before the Huskers scored twice, highlighted by freshman Kiki Stokes' go-ahead, two-out, inside-the-park home run. That began the stretch of four final-at bat victories in eight games for the Huskers.

Six days after the win at Wichita State, Stokes delivered again, belting a walk-off three-run homer in the bottom of the 10th inning that gave Nebraska a 4-1 win over New Mexico State. Four days later against UNO, sophomore Mattie Fowler delivered a walk-off, two-run single with two outs in the bottom of the seventh inning to lift Nebraska to a 3-2 come-from-behind victory. Three days after that win, junior Taylor Edwards was hit by a pitch with the bases loaded to bring home the winning run with two outs in the bottom of the eighth inning of a 5-4 win over Northwestern.

Then last weekend at Illinois, the Huskers rallied from a 2-1 seventh-inning deficit to post a 7-2 victory. Senior Courtney Breault tied the game with a clutch pinch-hit, RBI single and Stokes' bases-loaded walk gave Nebraska a 3-2 lead. Taylor Edwards then secured the victory with a three-run double.

Three of the games Nebraska has won in its final at bat have been extra-inning contests. The Huskers are 3-0 in extra-innings this season and have won six straight extra-inning games dating back to 2012, when Nebraska was also 3-0 in extra innings.

ROAD WARRIORS

The Huskers are 3-1 on their current seven-game road trip, improving to 9-3 overall on the road this season with a win at No. 1 Oklahoma that snapped the Sooners' 17-game, season-opening win streak and losses to the top-ranked Sooners and then-No. 16 Arizona. The Huskers, who won six straight road games at one point to post the program's longest road wins streak since 2004, were just 7-12 on the road last season. Nebraska has exceeded last year's road win total while looking for a winning road record for just the third time in seven years.

NU has won eight of its last nine road games overall. Just one win this weekend would put the Huskers in a tie for the fourth-most road wins in school history.

GIVE ME FIVE

Husker hitting coach Diane Miller asks her hitters to "give her five," meaning score five runs per game. The theory being that NU will win most games if it can score five runs. Nebraska is averaging more than five runs per game this season, but where the Husker offense has really excelled at giving Miller "five" has been during Big Ten Conference play.

Nebraska scored at least five runs in all four of its Big Ten Conference victories this season, while losing the only game where it failed to score five runs. In their first 28 Big Ten games dating back to last season, the Huskers have averaged 5.4 runs per game. Nebraska has scored at least five runs in 15 of its 28 Big Ten games, owning a 12-3 record when scoring five runs and a 6-7 mark when failing to score five runs.

Overall this season, NU is 16-0 when scoring five-or-more runs and 9-7 when scoring fewer than five runs.

TATUM EDWARDS SHOWCASING POWER

In addition to impressive pitching statistics this year, junior Tatum Edwards has also showcased her power at the plate. Edwards has only been in the lineup for 25 of Nebraska's 33 games, after missing only two games in the batting order over her first two years combined. Despite fewer at bats, Edwards has showcased the power that help her earn All-Big 12 honors as a freshman in 2011 and All-Big Ten accolades as a sophomore last year.

In only 25 games and 23 starts in the lineup, Edwards has produced seven doubles and seven home runs. She is tied for the team lead with 14 extra-base hits and owns a team-high .681 slugging percentage. Fourteen of Edwards' 19 hits this season have gone for extra bases. Edwards has produced three two-hit games this year and in all three games, both hits went for extra bases. She owns two-homer games against New Mexico State and North Dakota State this spring, in addition to hitting two doubles against Northwestern.

STOKES EXCELLING IN LEADOFF ROLE

Freshman Kiki Stokes, a three-time high school All-American, has done well at reaching base out of her leadoff spot all season long, despite a recent hitting slumb. Stokes own a .459 on-base percentage and she ranks second on the team and fourth in the Big Ten Conference with 25 walks. Thanks in large part to her patience, Stokes has reached base safely in 29 of Nebraska's 33 games this season, including 19 games where she has reached base at least twice. Getting on base has helped Stokes score 33 runs, a total that leads Nebraska and ranks third in the Big Ten.

Included in her success reaching base are a pair of impressive streaks. Stokes posted a season-high streak of 13 consecutive games reaching base safely in February, including a 10-game stretch of drawing at least one walk. During the second weekend of the season, Stokes reached base safely in 14 of her 18 plate appearances in Nebraska's five-game schedule.

STOKES COMING THROUGH IN THE CLUTCH

Freshman Kiki Stokes, Nebraska's leadoff hitter and fastest player, has proven to be more than just a slapper. Primarily known for her speed and small-ball approach, Stokes has come through with two clutch, late-inning homers that helped lead Nebraska to victory.

On March 9 in game one of a doubleheader at Wichita State, Stokes stepped to the plate in a 1-1 tie with two outs in the top of the seventh inning. The Shockers had the momentum after tying the game in the bottom of the sixth, but Stokes came through with the game-winning hit. With the outfield drawn in to guard against her slapping abilities, Stokes lined a ball to left center that rolled all the way to the wall. She turned on her speed and made it all the way around the bases for an inside-the-park home run that provided the winning margin.

Six days later in the home opener against New Mexico State, Stokes stepped to the plate again in a 1-1 tie, this time with runners on first and second with one out in the bottom of the 10th inning. She went after the first pitch she saw and hit a towering home run to left center field for her first career walk-off home run.

Stokes owns three game-winning RBIs this season and all have come in the seventh inning or later. In addition to the two described above, Stokes notched the game-winning RBI with a bases-loaded walk that gave Nebraska a 3-2 seventh-inning lead at Illinois on March 30.

HUSKERS HOMERING AT RECORD RATE

Nebraska has reached both the 25- and 30-home run plateaus faster than any other team in school history this season. This year's group hit 25 home runs in 21 games, eclipsing the previous mark set by the 1998 team, who hit its 25th home run in its 26th game. NU produced its 30th homer in its 26th game this year, better the previous mark of 29 games set in 2002 and 2011.

This year's team has good company among the other three teams to produce 25 home runs in fewer than 30 games. The 1998 Huskers posted the best winning percentage in school history and finished in a tie for fifth at the Women's College World Series. The 2011 Huskers nearly cracked the top 10 while posting the best non-conference record in school history, while the 2002 Huskers also finished in a tie for fifth at the WCWS in Nebraska's last appearance in the event.

Ten Huskers have homered already this season - tying the school record - with junior twins Taylor (8 homers) and Tatum (7) Edwards leading the way. The duo has combined for 15 home runs this year, after totaling 12 combined homers in 2012. Senior Brooke Thomason has homered five times, while freshmen Hailey Decker and Dawna Tyson each own three home runs.

Nebraska is currently on pace to hit 61 homers in a 56-game schedule, which would challenge the school record of 62 home runs in 1998. The Huskers could also field a lineup this season where all nine players in the batting order have home run, a feat that would be a first in school history. The Huskers' normal starting batting order when Tatum Edwards pitches features eight players who have homered this season. The only player without a home run in those lineups is senior Gabby Banda, who homered four times in 2012.

From a career standpoint, this year's team features three of the top 10 home run hitters in school history in Thomason and the Edwards twins, all three of whom have hit at least 28 home runs. Thomason and Taylor Edwards are tied for fourth in school history with 31 career home runs each, while Tatum sits in a tie for seventh place with 28 home runs. Nebraska has three players in the same lineup with 20 career home runs for only the third time in school history (also in 1998 and 2012) and two players with 30 home runs for just the second time (1998). No Husker team has ever featured three players with 30 career home runs.

TURNING TWO BECOMING ROUTINE

Nebraska has recorded a Big Ten-leading 21 double plays through 33 games this season, including turning at least one double play in eight consecutive games from Feb. 15 to Feb. 23. The Huskers, who rank fourth nationally in double plays per game, have already topped last year's 55-game total of 16 doubles plays. Since 2000, the most double plays NU has turned in a season is 22 in 2004. Included in this year's total are four games where the Huskers have turned two double plays.

NEBRASKA BY THE NUMBERS

50 **NCAA TOURNAMENT VICTORIES**
Nebraska has won 50 games in its 20 NCAA Tournament appearances while posting an overall record of 50-42 (.543 winning percentage). The Huskers' 50 wins rank 13th in NCAA history.

29 **ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICANS**
A total of 21 Huskers have combined to earn 29 CoSIDA Academic All-America honors. That total is the most of any softball program in the country and ranks second among all female athletic programs nationally behind the Nebraska volleyball team (37).

20 **NCAA TOURNAMENT APPEARANCES**
In the first 31 years softball has been an NCAA sport, the Huskers have made 20 appearances in the NCAA Tournament, including 13 straight from 1995 to 2007. Nebraska's 20 postseason appearances rank 12th in NCAA history.

21 **ALL-AMERICANS**
Nebraska has produced 21 All-Americans in school history, including six first-team All-Americans, four two-time honorees and a pair of three-time All-Americans.

18 **CONFERENCE TITLES**
Nebraska has won 18 conference titles in its 36 seasons as a varsity sport. The Huskers won 12 Big Eight titles and six Big 12 crowns and are looking for their first Big Ten title.

15 **ALL-AMERICANS UNDER REVELLE**
In her first 20 years as Nebraska's head coach, Rhonda Revelle has guided 10 players to a total of 15 All-America honors.

13 **TOP-25 NATIONAL FINISHES**
Nebraska has been ranked in the final NFCA poll in 13 of the 18 years the poll has existed. The Huskers were one of only six teams nationally to be ranked in the final poll in each of the first 12 years it existed (1995 to 2006).

13 **REVELLE'S ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICANS**
Rhonda Revelle has produced 13 Academic All-Americans in her first 20 seasons as Nebraska's coach. Over that time frame, Revelle has coached more academic All-Americans than any other coach in the country.

6 **WOMEN'S COLLEGE WORLD SERIES**
Nebraska has advanced to the Women's College World Series six times to rank 13th in NCAA history.

6 **TOP 10 ATTENDANCE SEASONS**
In the 11 years the Huskers have called Bowlin Stadium home, Nebraska has ranked in the top 10 nationally in average attendance six times.

FABULOUS FRESHMEN

Nebraska's talented seven-player freshman class has made an immediate impact. Freshmen lead the team in several categories, including Kiki Stokes, who leads Nebraska in runs (32), triples (1) and stolen bases (8), Emily Lockman, who owns Nebraska's best ERA (1.38) and Danica Bishop, who is tied for the team lead in saves (1).

Stokes and Hailey Decker have started every game this season, while Alicia Armstrong has made 32 starts, missing one game due to an ankle injury. Lockman has started 15 games in the circle, while Dawna Tyson has earned 24 starts, 15 as the designated player and nine at first base. Overall, the freshmen have combined for 137 starts this season, as NU has started at least three freshmen in every game, including 14 games where five freshmen were in the starting lineup.

Offensively, the freshmen have combined for a solid .287 batting average with 11 doubles, one triple, 11 home runs and 46 RBIs. The group is slugging .423 and reaching base at a .386 clip. In the circle, Lockman and Bishop have combined for a 9-2 record with three shutouts, one save and a 1.41 ERA. Lockman is 9-2 with a 1.38 ERA in 86.1 innings, ranking second in the Big Ten in ERA. Bishop has made five appearances, posting a 1.75 ERA with one save. She has not allowed an earned run in four of her five appearances, including 1.1 shutout innings of relief against No. 1 Oklahoma.

REVELLE BECOMES NEBRASKA'S ALL-TIME COACHING WINS LEADER

Nebraska's 10-5 victory at Oklahoma State in the second game of a March 3 doubleheader was a historic one, as it made Rhonda Revelle Nebraska's all-time wins leader across all sports. The victory was Revelle's 768th at Nebraska, as she passed former baseball coach John Sanders, who won 767 games from 1978 to 1997.

THOMASON SETS GRAND SLAM RECORD

Senior Brooke Thomason hit her third career grand slam against Utah State on March 16 giving Nebraska the necessary runs for a 9-0, run-rule victory. Thomason is the first known player in school history to hit three career grand slams. All three of her bases-loaded blasts have come in less than a calendar year.

Her first career grand slam was a dramatic shot that capped a two-homer game for the native of Overland Park, Kan. In Nebraska's first-ever Big Ten Conference game, Thomason belted a walk-off grand slam with two outs in the bottom of the seventh inning against Northwestern on March 23, 2012, to lift Nebraska to a 9-6 come-from-behind victory. Two weeks later, Thomason hit her second career grand slam, another walk-off shot that wrapped up an 11-0, six-inning victory over Illinois on April 6.

Thomason's most recent grand slam was the third by a Husker in 2013, as junior Taylor Edwards tied an NCAA record with two grand slams in one game against Illinois-Chicago on Feb. 9. NU's three grand slams this season not only tie its total from all of last season, but rank as the most grand slams in a season since at least 2000.

THOMASON JOINS EXCLUSIVE CLUBS

Senior Brooke Thomason joined a pair of exclusive clubs this season. Thomason scored her 100th career run against Maryland on Feb. 22, becoming the ninth Husker to record 100 career hits, runs and RBIs and the first since Julie Brechtel in 2011. Thomason then hit her 30th career home run the next day against No. 9 Oregon. The blast allowed her to become the fourth Husker to total both 30 career home runs and 30 career doubles.

TATUM EDWARDS HITS WELL WHEN PITCHING

Tatum Edwards has proven to be a dangerous hitter, as her ability with the bat has been the primary reason she has earned all-conference honors in each of her first two seasons. As Edwards has taken on an added pitching role this season, one might wonder if her offensive numbers may suffer as she pitches more innings. But that hasn't been the case for the junior thus far in her career. In fact, Edwards has put up better numbers when she's pitching than when she's the designated player or starts in the field.

Below is a look at Edwards' career batting statistics when she is also the starting pitcher, as well as a comparison of Edwards' statistics when she pitches and when she does not.

THOMASON HAS BEEN MISS CONSISTENT

Senior Brooke Thomason has been a consistent performer through her first three full seasons, batting better than .300 each year while producing at least seven home runs and 30 RBIs every year. This spring, Thomason has already produced more than 30 RBIs for the fourth straight season, and she is batting .365 with five home runs and 32 RBIs. Her consistency has been nearly unmatched in school history.

Thomason is bidding to post a .300 batting average for the fourth straight season in 2013. Only five players in school history (Denise Day, Tobin Echo-Hawk, Jennifer Lizama, Kim Ogee and Ali Viola) have posted a .300 batting average every season of their careers. Each of those five players earned All-America honors in their Husker careers and four were multi-time All-Americans, as the group combined for 11 total All-America awards.

Thomason is also on pace to become the first player in school history to produce four seasons with at least seven home runs. The only Husker to begin her career with three straight seasons with at least seven home runs before Tatum Edwards matched her this spring, Thomason is two home runs shy from having four seven-homer seasons.

From an RBI standpoint, Thomason ranks third in school history with 151 career RBIs, including a Husker junior-record 47 RBIs last season. Thomason was the first Husker ever to open her career with three straight 30-RBI seasons. She has 32 RBIs this season, becoming the first Husker to produce four 30-RBI seasons.

HUSKERS PRODUCE SECOND-HIGHEST CONFERENCE RUN TOTAL VS. NORTHWESTERN

Nebraska scored 14 runs in game two of a doubleheader with Northwestern on March 22 in a 14-1, five-inning victory. The 14 runs marked the second-highest run total the Huskers have ever scored in a conference game. It was one shy of matching the school record set on April 6, 1996 in a 15-11 Big 12 Conference victory over Kansas. The 14 runs scored against Northwestern were the most runs Nebraska has ever scored in a conference game of fewer than seven innings.

THOMASON JOINED 100-100-100 CLUB THIS SEASON

Senior Brooke Thomason has joined an elite group in Husker history this season, becoming only the ninth player to produce 100 career hits, RBIs and runs scored. While Thomason has already joined the club, junior twins Tatum and Taylor Edwards both have a chance to join the group this season. If one of them can join Thomason in the 100-100-100 club, it will mark only the second time (2003) a Husker team featured two players in the club.

Taylor Edwards also has an excellent shot at joining the club this season, attempting to join Crystal Carwile and Ali Viola as the only Huskers to join the club prior to their senior season. Edwards has already produced more than 100 hits and RBIs in her career and needs four more runs scored to join the group. Taylor's twin sister Tatum could also join the club this season, as she enters this weekend needing five RBIs and 22 runs scored.

LOCKMAN TOSSES FIRST CAREER NO-HITTER

Freshman right-hander Emily Lockman joined an elite group of Husker pitchers by tossing her first career no-hitter, a six-inning effort against Utah State on Feb. 16. Lockman is the first Husker freshman to throw a no-hitter since Summer Tobias in 2003 and just the fifth ever. The first two freshmen to throw no-hitters ended their careers as All-Americans. Lori Sippel, currently in her 24th season as Nebraska's pitching coach, tossed a pair of no-hitters during her freshman season in 1985, while Jenny Voss threw a no-hitter as a freshman in 1997.

Lockman's no-hitter came in only her fourth career start and was the earliest no-hitter in school history. A native of Corona, Calif., Lockman is just the second Husker to throw a no-hitter in the month of February, joining All-American Peaches James who recorded her second career no-hitter as a senior on Feb. 20, 2004 against Houston. Lockman recorded her first career no-hitter faster than any other pitcher in school history, needing only her fourth start, bettering the previous record of seven starts by Tobias.

HUSKER HITTERS LEAVING MARK IN NU RECORD BOOK

Senior Brooke Thomason and junior twins Tatum and Taylor Edwards have left their marks on the Husker record books in their careers. Thomason owns a .330 career batting average with 39 doubles, 31 home runs, 151 RBIs and a .561 slugging percentage. She enters this weekend third on Nebraska's all-time RBI chart, tied for fourth in home runs and extra-base hits (70), sixth in doubles, seventh in slugging percentage and walks (83), eighth in total bases (320) and 12th in batting average.

Taylor Edwards, the only All-America catcher in school history, enters this weekend with the fourth-best slugging percentage (.614) in Husker history, tied for the fourth-most home runs (31), the fifth-most RBIs (139) and walks (97) and the 15th-best batting average (.318). Using averages from her first two years, Edwards is on pace to finish her career with a school-record total in walks, the second-most RBIs and third-most home runs.

Tatum Edwards ranks sixth on Nebraska's all-time charts in slugging percentage (.572) and tied for seventh in home runs (28). Tatum could crack the Huskers' all-time top 10 in RBIs before the end of her junior season.

HUSKERS KNOCK OFF NO. 1 FOR SECOND TIME IN SCHOOL HISTORY

Behind a seven-hit shutout from Emily Lockman and a solo home run from Tatum Edwards, Nebraska upset top-ranked Oklahoma, 1-0, in Norman on March 2. The win was Nebraska's second victory over a top-ranked opponent in school history, joining a 1-0 upset of No. 1 Florida on March 12, 2011. The win over the Gators came at a neutral site in Clearwater, Fla., as the win over Oklahoma marked the highest ranked opponent the Huskers have ever defeated on the road. The win also snapped the Sooners' 17-game season-opening win streak.

TAYLOR EDWARDS SETS SCHOOL RECORDS

Junior Taylor Edwards put together one of the most impressive individual performances in school history during a 13-4, five-inning victory over Illinois-Chicago on Feb. 9. Edwards had two grand slams and eight RBIs in the win, with both of her grand slams coming with two outs and on a 1-2 pitch. Her eight RBIs were a new school record, and her two grand slams were a first in school history and also tied school records for most grand slams in a season. Edwards is just the fourth player in NCAA history to hit two grand slams in the same game and the first since Holly Krzan of UAB did it against Nicholls State on Feb. 17, 2007.

LOCKMAN TWO-TIME BIG TEN FRESHMAN OF THE WEEK

Emily Lockman earned her second Big Ten Freshman-of-the-Week honor on March 4. She was honored for the first time on Feb. 18. Lockman's first award came after she posted a 2-0 record with a pair of shutouts, 15 strikeouts and a 0.41 ERA at the Hillenbrand Invitational in Tucson, Ariz. Included in that performance was a six-inning no-hitter against Utah State that was the first no-hitter by a Husker freshman since 2003 and just the fourth overall. She added a career-high eight strikeouts against the Aggies.

Two weeks later, Lockman again posted a 2-0 record with road wins at Oklahoma and Oklahoma State. She threw a seven-hit shutout against the top-ranked Sooners, handing OU its first loss of the year.

TYSON NAMED BIG TEN FRESHMAN OF THE WEEK

Dawna Tyson was named the Big Ten Freshman of the Week on March 11. Tyson was honored for her outstanding performance in game two at Wichita State on March 9. Tyson reached base in all three of her plate appearances, finishing 2-for-2 with a hit-by-pitch. She homered for her third consecutive game and produced three RBIs.

TAYLOR EDWARDS NAMED BIG TEN PLAYER OF THE WEEK

Junior catcher Taylor Edwards was named the first Big Ten Player of the Week for the 2013 season on Feb. 11. Edwards went 10-for-18 on the weekend, posting a .556 batting average to go along with a .636 on-base percentage and 1.167 slugging percentage. She also homered three times, doubled twice and drove in 15 runs.

Against Illinois-Chicago, Edwards hit a pair of grand slams to become the first Husker to hit two grand slams in one game. She finished with eight RBIs in Nebraska's 13-4 victory, setting a school record for most RBIs in a game. Edwards enjoyed another big game in the tournament finale against New Mexico, finishing 3-for-3 with a double, a home run and five RBIs.

HUSKERS TIED BEST 10-GAME START IN SCHOOL HISTORY

With a 9-1 record through its first 10 games, Nebraska matched the best 10-game start in school history. This season marked the fourth time in Husker history that a team has won nine of its first 10 games, a feat that also happened in 1996, 2003, 2006 and 2011. Nebraska also posted 11 victories in the month of February, tying for the third-most February wins in school history. The Huskers' lone loss among its first 10 games and all four February losses overall came against top-20 opponents.

NEBRASKA WAS SUCCESSFUL IN SEASON'S OPENING MONTH

Nebraska finished 11-4 in February, allowing the Huskers to go from unranked and not receiving any votes to a No. 25 national ranking in the first USA Softball/ESPN.com poll in the month of March. The Huskers' 11 victories tied for the third-most in the month of February in school history.

Only the 2011 (14) and 2003 (12) Huskers won more games in February than this year's team. The 2002 squad also won 11 games in February. Each of those three teams went on to successful seasons and ended the year in the top 25.

The 2011 Huskers notched the first victory over a No. 1 team in school history, the 2003 squad climbed to the highest ranking in school history (No. 3) and the 2002 Huskers were the last NU team to play in the WCWS.

NEBRASKA'S GOLDEN GIRLS

Nebraska has enjoyed both recent and historical success recruiting talented players from California. The 2013 Husker roster features six natives of the Golden State. Included in that group are three players who earned California player-of-the-year honors during their high school careers. Junior Tatum Edwards was named the state's freshman of the year in 2007, while her twin sister Taylor was the California Junior of the Year in 2009, in addition to earning accolades as the nation's top junior from EA Sports. The third member of the Golden State player-of-the-year trio is freshman Emily Lockman, who was the California Gatorade Player of the Year in 2012.

Senior Courtney Breault, a 2012 second-team All-Big Ten and 2010 SEC All-Freshman Team selection (at Arkansas), and freshmen Danica Bishop and Dawna Tyson round out the California natives on NU's 2013 roster.

REVELLE IN 21ST SEASON AT NEBRASKA

Rhonda Revelle is in her 21st season at Nebraska. She is one of 22 active Division I coaches who have spent more than 20 seasons at their current school. Revelle owns a 780-414 record at NU and a career mark of 788-430. Revelle needs 12 wins to reach 800 in her career.

PITCHING STAFF POSTED FANTASTIC FEBRUARY

Nebraska's pitching was tremendous in the season's opening month, especially considering the Huskers' three pitchers had combined for only 130.0 career innings entering this season. Nebraska boasted a 1.44 February ERA that ranked third in the Big Ten Conference.

The Huskers allowed one earned run or less in 11 of 15 games in February, including five shutouts and a sixth game where Nebraska did not allow an earned run, but did allow a run. During a stretch that began with Illinois-Chicago on Feb. 10 and ended with Purdue on Feb. 17, NU threw three shutouts and one no-hitter, while tossing 38.1 consecutive innings without allowing an earned run.

The pitching staff also fared well against some of the nation's best teams in February. Junior Tatum Edwards allowed just two earned runs in a pair of complete-game efforts against No. 19 Arizona and No. 1 Oklahoma, taking a no-hitter into the seventh inning against the Sooners. She also threw a shutout against No. 24 Florida State. Emily Lockman started against No. 8 California, firing a four-hitter and holding Cal to a season-low one run.

Nebraska finished February with a 1.44 ERA, just missing posting Nebraska's lowest ERA in the month since 2000. Since 2000, the lowest ERA a Husker team has ever posted after the opening month of the season was 1.43 in 2003, when Nebraska went 12-1 in February and climbed to as high as No. 3 in the national polls.

FOWLER AND THOMASON SELECTED AS HUSKER CO-CAPTAINS

Sophomore Mattie Fowler and senior Brooke Thomason will serve as Nebraska's co-captains for the 2013 season. Thomason is a four-year starter in right field who was a second-team All-Big 12 selection in 2010 and a second-team All-Big Ten pick in 2012. Fowler is one of the lead organizers for team functions. She was Nebraska's starting shortstop as a freshman in 2012, producing five doubles, five home runs and 27 RBI's, including driving in the winning run in five of Nebraska's 14 Big Ten Conference victories. Fowler has moved to first base this spring.

PROGRAM STABILITY

Nebraska softball is renowned for its tradition and one of the Huskers' richest traditions is stability. Nowhere is this highlighted more than looking at NU Head Coach Rhonda Revelle and Associate Head Coach Lori Sippel.

Revelle is in her 21st season at the helm of the Husker program in 2013, while Sippel is in her 24th year in Lincoln. Both coaches also played for Nebraska, with Revelle enjoying a three-year career and Sippel starring for four years. Counting their playing and coaching days, Revelle and Sippel have combined to be a part of 1,089 of Nebraska's 1,256 all-time victories (87 percent).

HUSKER OFFENSE HOPES TO CONTINUE UPWARD TREND

Hitting coach Diane Miller has produced impressive results in her first four seasons at Nebraska, helping the Husker offense enjoy some of the most productive seasons in school history. Following an outstanding opening weekend, Nebraska's offense hopes to continue its upward trend in Miller's fifth season.

Below is a compilation of statistics from the 2005 to 2008 seasons - the four years prior to Miller's arrival - and the 2009 to 2012 seasons - Miller's first four years in Lincoln. Nebraska is batting .020 better, slugging .071 higher and reaching base nearly four percent more often during Miller's tenure than during the same time frame prior to her arrival. The Huskers are also averaging 1.0 run more per game during that span, while averaging 62 more RBIs per season, 50 more walks, 20 more home runs and 19 more doubles.

In addition to the impressive statistical comparison above:

- ▶ Nebraska has hit at least 30 home runs in each of Miller's first four seasons, tying the longest stretch of consecutive 30-homer seasons in school history (also 1995-98 and 2000-03).
- ▶ The Huskers have produced at least 55 doubles every season under Miller, tying the longest consecutive stretch of seasons with at least 55 doubles in school history (also 1995-98 and 2000-03).
- ▶ NU has totaled more than 200 RBIs in each of Miller's first four seasons. The only longer stretch in Husker history came from 2000 to 2004, when Nebraska produced five straight seasons with 200 RBIs.
- ▶ Nebraska has scored at least 200 runs in every season under Miller's instruction. The only longer stretch in Husker history was seven seasons from 2000 to 2006.

Finally, as the following chart indicates, the Husker offense has been especially strong the past two seasons, posting some of the top marks in school history, including Nebraska season records for walks, highest on-base percentage and highest slugging percentage:

HUSKERS AT THE HEAD OF THE CLASS

Nebraska leads all softball programs nationally with 29 CoSIDA Academic All-America awards won by 21 players. The total also ranks second nationally among all female athletic programs, trailing only the Husker volleyball team's 37 selections. Overall, NU leads all institutions nationally with 302 academic All-Americans across all sports.

NU is one of only three softball programs with 20 or more selections. Since Rhonda Revelle became Nebraska's head coach in 1993, she has produced 13 academic All-Americans, the highest total of any coach during that span.

NEBRASKA 10TH-FASTEST PROGRAM TO POST 1,000 NCAA VICTORIES

Since softball became an official NCAA sport in 1982, Nebraska has posted 1,126 victories, winning its 1,000th game at Women's College World Series qualifier Missouri on May 2, 2009. Although no official statistic is kept for victories in the NCAA era, according to research from CBS College Sports, the Huskers were the 10th program to win 1,000 games as an NCAA sport. The nine other teams that reached 1,000 NCAA wins before Nebraska were UCLA, Arizona, Florida State, Cal State Fullerton, Louisiana-Lafayette, California, Texas A&M, Oklahoma and East Carolina.

OLYMPIC CONNECTIONS

Although softball is no longer an official Olympic sport, Nebraska had four players compete in a total of three Olympic Games, with Huskers competing in the 1996, 2004 and 2008 Olympic Games. Associate Head Coach Lori Sippel was the first Husker to play in the Olympics, as she pitched for Team Canada at the 1996 Atlanta Olympics.

Sippel then served as Team Canada head coach for the 2008 Beijing Olympics, when the Canadians finished fourth, their best finish ever. Former Huskers Sheena Lawrick and Robin Mackin were on that Canadian team, while Lawrick and Stephanie Skegas (Greece) competed in the 2004 Olympics.

From a Team USA standpoint, junior Taylor Edwards and freshman Hailey Decker both earned an invitation to try out for the Junior National Team in 2010.
