

# 2014 NEBRASKA SEASON REVIEW & NOTEBOOK

Championships and offensive records were the theme for Nebraska in 2014. The Huskers won a share of their first Big Ten Conference regular-season title, then won an NCAA Regional championship for the second straight season. Along the way, NU set school records for home runs, RBIs, slugging percentage, extra-base hits and total bases.

The season began with Nebraska earning a preseason top-10 ranking for the first time in more than a decade. The Huskers proved worthy of their lofty ranking, opening the season with an 8-2 record that included wins over No. 12 Florida State and No. 12 Texas A&M. Following the strong start, the Huskers lost three consecutive games to top-15 opponents in late February.

Nebraska began the month of March by splitting a doubleheader at Oklahoma against a Sooner squad that finished the season with a No. 5 national ranking. Two more top-10 foes awaited the Huskers the next weekend and after a 1-0 eight-inning loss to No. 7 Arizona State, senior Taylor Edwards powered Nebraska to a dramatic 2-1 come-from-behind victory over No. 6 Washington the next day.

The Huskies, who hit a walk-off home run to defeat Nebraska in the opening game of the 2013 Women's College World Series, led 1-0 with two outs in the bottom of the seventh inning when Edwards stepped up to the plate and crushed a walk-off two-run homer to give NU its fourth win over a ranked team.

Nebraska entered Big Ten Conference play with a 19-8 record and riding a four-game winning streak. But the Huskers struggled early in conference play, losing a home series to No. 16 Minnesota in the opening weekend of conference play. NU then fell to 1-3 in Big Ten action with a run-rule loss at No. 23 Northwestern to open the second weekend of conference play.

The run-rule defeat to the Wildcats proved to be a turning point. Nebraska's overall record stood at 21-11 following the loss, but the Huskers rebounded to go 19-3 to close the regular season. The Huskers' turnaround was immediate, as Nebraska outscored the ranked Wildcats 23-4 in the final two games of the series.

After winning a road series at Illinois the next weekend, the Huskers were absolutely dominant in home sweeps of Iowa and Ohio State in back-to-back weekends in mid-April. In the series opener against the Hawkeyes, Tatum Edwards delivered a walk-off, three-run homer in the bottom of the seventh inning to give NU a 5-2 victory. The Huskers then run-ruled Iowa in the final two games, outscoring the Hawkeyes by a combined score of 27-1, including an 18-0 five-inning victory in the series finale when Nebraska set school records for runs scored in a conference game and margin of victory against a conference opponent.

The following weekend, Nebraska allowed a run in the top of the first inning of game one against Ohio State, only to outscore the Buckeyes 30-0 the rest of the series, winning by 13 runs in game one and by identical 8-0 run-rule margins in games two and three. The Huskers run-ruled a conference opponent every game in a three-game series for the first time in program history.

Nebraska kept its momentum by sweeping Michigan State in East Lansing the final weekend in April, shutting out the Spartans in every game while outscoring MSU 16-0 in the series. The Huskers then earned their 12th consecutive conference victory and 11th straight win overall by run-ruling Wisconsin in the first game of an April 30 doubleheader, 12-0. Although Nebraska's win streaks were snapped in a game two loss to the Badgers, the Huskers magnificent April run had put them in contention for a Big Ten title.

Nebraska went 15-3 in April and turned a 3-3 conference record to begin the month into a 15-5 mark by month's end. The Huskers' dominance in April was highlighted by a 12-game conference win streak, when NU posted eight run-rule victories and outscored its opponents 111-11 during the streak, including 76-1 over the final seven games of the win streak, when Nebraska tossed six straight shutouts.

Following the outstanding April, Nebraska entered the final conference weekend needing to sweep Indiana and have Michigan lose at least twice to Wisconsin. The Huskers took care of their end, outscoring the Hoosiers 14-4 in a three-game sweep at Bowlin Stadium. An hour after the Huskers closed the regular season with an 8-3 victory powered by a career-high five RBIs from Kylee Muir, Nebraska watched as Wisconsin upset Michigan in extra innings to take the series from the Wolverines and give Nebraska a share of its first Big Ten Conference title and the program's first conference title overall since 2004.

But the Huskers weren't satisfied with a conference title. They sought a second straight trip to the Women's College World Series. Nebraska's postseason run did not begin as the Huskers had hoped, as NU lost to Kansas in a first-round game at the NCAA Columbia (Mo.) Regional. The Huskers then won four games in less than 24 hours to come out of the loser's bracket and win their second straight regional title. Nebraska defeated No. 15 Missouri twice on its home field to earn the regional title. Hailey Decker powered the Huskers to the title, homering four times in the two games against the Tigers.

Needing two more victories to make it back to Oklahoma City, NU's defense faltered in back-to-back one-run losses at Alabama, which went on to finish as the national runner-up. The Huskers enjoyed a three-run lead in game one, but Alabama chipped away and tied the game with a seventh-inning homer before winning it with a 12th-inning walk-off blast. Alabama's first four runs were unearned, and the Crimson Tide used two more unearned runs in game two to hold on for a 2-1 victory. In the series, six of Alabama's eight runs were unearned, as Nebraska committed six errors while losing the two games by a combined 8-6 margin.

Although the Huskers fell just short of a second straight WCWS bid, Nebraska posted its second straight 40-win season by finishing with a 44-18 record and finished in the top 10 nationally for the eighth time in the last 18 years.

## HUSKERS POST HIGHEST CONFERENCE & ROAD WIN TOTALS

Nebraska finished with an 18-6 road record, setting a school record for road victories for the second straight season, after winning 17 road contests in 2013. The Huskers' 18 road wins ranked second nationally in 2014. Nebraska also set a school record with 18 Big Ten Conference victories, eclipsing the 16 conference games NU won in 1998 and 2013.

## NEBRASKA NOTCHES SECOND STRAIGHT 40-WIN SEASON

Nebraska won 44 games in 2014, tying for the seventh-most victories in school history. Overall, the Huskers won at least 40 games in a season for the 12th time in program history and for the third time in four seasons.

## HUSKER OFFENSE SETS FIVE SCHOOL RECORDS

For the fourth straight year in 2014, Nebraska's offense posted some of the best totals in school history. The 2014 Huskers set school records with 73 home runs, 173 extra-base hits, 325 RBIs, 827 total bases and a .495 slugging percentage, smashing the previous record by .028. The 2014 offense also finished second in the NU record books with 352 runs, 90 doubles and 49 hit-by-pitches, while ranking third with a .388 on-base percentage and fourth with a .298 average and 498 hits and fifth with 199 walks. The Huskers also hit the most postseason home runs in school history, slugging 12 homers in seven NCAA Tournament games.

Individually, Taylor Edwards tied the school record with 41 walks in her senior season. She also finished second with 18 home runs and 13 hit-by-pitches in 2014. Sophomore Hailey Decker tied Nebraska's single-season extra-base hit record with 35 in 2014, finishing second on NU's all-time chart with 21 doubles and eighth with 14 home runs.

## BIG RED LEADS THE BIG TEN IN ERA

Nebraska ranked 13th nationally and led the Big Ten with a 1.92 ERA in 2014, marking the second straight season the Huskers had posted the league's lowest ERA. Senior right-hander Tatum Edwards led the Big Ten with a 1.78 ERA, while sophomore right-hander Emily Lockman ranked fourth with a mark of 2.08. The duo were each named to the NFCA All-Midwest Region team for the second consecutive year, marking the first time in program history the same pair of pitchers repeated as first-team all-region honorees. Lockman also became the first Husker pitcher to be a first-team all-region performer as both a freshman and a sophomore.

Edwards won 24 games in 2014, while Lockman notched 20 victories. Together, the duo became just the third pair of Husker pitchers to both win 20 games in the same season, joining Jenny Voss and Leigh Ann Walker in 2000 and Walker and Peaches James in 2002.

## EDWARDS TWINS CAP CAREERS AS TWO-TIME ALL-AMERICANS

Senior twins Tatum and Taylor Edwards were each named NFCA All-Americans in 2014, the second honor for each player. Taylor was a first-team All-American and the NFCA Division I Catcher of the Year. The only All-America catcher in school history, Taylor was also a third-team honoree as a freshman in 2011. She was also the first Husker to be named a first-team All-American since Jenny Voss in 1998 and just the sixth player overall to be recognized as a first-team All-American.

Tatum earned third-team accolades as a pitcher/utility player in 2014, after being a second-team All-American as a junior in 2013. She was just the seventh Husker to earn All-America accolades in back-to-back seasons and the first since Jennifer Lizama in 1999 and 2000. Together, the Edwards twins became the seventh and eighth two-time All-Americans in Nebraska softball history.

Nebraska had two All-Americans in the same season for the first time since 1998, while the twins' selections increased the Huskers' all-time total to 24 All-America awards.

## TATUM EDWARDS TOSSES TWO NO-HITTERS

Tatum Edwards tossed the only two no-hitters of her career in her senior season. She threw a six-inning no-hitter against Boise State in her home state of California on Feb. 23, allowing only two walks and striking out five. Edwards then joined two-time All-American Lori Sippel - Nebraska's pitching coach - as the only Huskers to throw a postseason no-hitter when Edwards no-hit Bradley in NU's 9-0 five-inning victory over the Braves at the NCAA Regional. In that game, Edwards walked two and struck out three.

## TAYLOR EDWARDS SETS NU CAREER HOME RUN MARK

Taylor Edwards hit 18 home runs in 2014, tying the total from her freshman year for the second-highest mark in school history. Fueled by two of NU's three highest single-season home run totals, Edwards ended her career as Nebraska's all-time leader with 54 home runs. She broke the previous record of 53 set by three-time All-American Ali Viola. Edwards' record-breaking homer came in a victory at No. 15 Missouri in the NCAA Regional.

## FOUR HUSKERS NAMED FIRST-TEAM ALL-REGION

Hailey Decker, Tatum and Taylor Edwards and Emily Lockman were each named to the NFCA All-Midwest Region first team in 2014. The four first-team honorees were the second-most in program history and the most since 2002. The Huskers were one of eight teams nationally with four first-team all-region honorees. Lockman and the Edwards twins each earned first-team all-region accolades for the second time in their careers. Lockman is the first Husker pitcher to be a first-team all-region selection as both a freshman and a sophomore, while Tatum Edwards and Lockman became the first pair of Nebraska pitchers to earn first-team all-region honors in consecutive seasons.

## SEVEN HUSKERS EARNED ALL-BIG TEN HONORS

Hailey Decker and twins Tatum and Taylor Edwards each earned first-team All-Big Ten accolades in 2014, while Alicia Armstrong, MJ Knighten and Emily Lockman were second-team honorees. The Edwards twins were first-team All-Big Ten performers for the second straight season, and Tatum was the pitcher on the Big Ten All-Defensive team and Taylor was the catcher. Tatum ended her career as a four-time all-conference honoree, while Taylor garnered three all-conference selections in her career.

Armstrong and Lockman both earned second-team All-Big Ten accolades for the second straight season as sophomores. Lockman became just the fourth Husker pitcher to be named an all-conference performer as both a freshman and a sophomore. Knighten earned second-team All-Big Ten honors as a freshman. Knighten was the only freshman position player named All-Big Ten, and she was the first Husker freshman third baseman to be an all-conference selection since Tobin Echo-Hawk in 1993.

## REVELLE NAMED BIG TEN COACH OF THE YEAR

Rhonda Revelle was selected as the 2014 Big Ten Coach of the Year in a vote of her peers. The honor was the fourth of Revelle's career, as she was voted the Big 12 Coach of the Year in both 1998 and 2001 and the Big Eight Coach of the Year in 1995. Revelle has been honored as coach of the year in three different conferences.

A NFCA Hall of Fame member, Revelle led a young 2014 Husker team to the program's first conference title in a decade and a second straight NCAA Super Regional appearance. NU's roster consisted of 75 percent freshmen and sophomores, with only four upperclassmen among its 16 members.

## NU NAMED REGIONAL COACHING STAFF OF THE YEAR

For the second year in a row, the Nebraska softball coaching staff was honored as the NFCA Midwest Region Coaching Staff of the Year in 2014.

Head Coach Rhonda Revelle shared the award with Associate Head Coach Lori Sippel, Assistant Coach Diane Miller and Director of Softball Operations Katie Brown. A Revelle-led staff earned the regional coaching honor for the fourth time. The back-to-back honors are a first in school history.

The coaching staff led Nebraska to a share of its first Big Ten regular-season title and the seventh 40-win regular season in school history. NU also set school records with 18 road wins and 18 conference victories.
